






SECOND LEVEL






for NWAV44 Attendees:





F. Distillery District





TTC: The Toronto Transit Commission is a public transport agency that operates subway, bus, streetcar, paratransit, and rapid transit services in Toronto. The closest TTC station from Hart House is Museum Station located on University Ave. and Bloor St. W. Fare: \$3. Trains run every 3 to 6 minutes from about 6 AM to about 1:20 AM, except on Sundays when they start around 9 AM. See ttc.ca, TTC mobile application: "TTC Watch for Toronto" for Apple and "Transit Now Toronto for TTC" for Android.

Paying TTC fares: Crossing the turnstile in a subway station requires \$3 in exact change or a token; tokens can be purchased at the window or from a machine where available. Boarding a bus or a streetcar on the street also costs \$3 in exact change or one token. Transferring from one mode of transportation to another within a subway station can be done freely, but doing so out on the street requires a paper transfer pass (picked up where you paid your fare). Day-passes on the TTC system are available for \$11.50 each; if a person is making more than three trips on the TTC within a day, buying a day-pass is the cheapest option.

Welcome to NWAV, the premier conference on Variationist Sociolinguistics worldwide.

We have a lot to offer you!

Our objectives for NWAV 44: Variation at the Crossroads - Advancing Theory by Integrating Methods are to foster the study of language in social context by providing a venue in which the latest theoretical, methodological and technical developments in quantitative analysis of language are showcased. NWAV 44 comes at a critical moment in the field. After 40 years of building on strong empirical foundations, the time has come for re-engagement with linguistics more broadly and integration across related disciplines. Understanding how people deploy variation to facilitate communication while the language continues to change is a fundamental element in understanding language, society and interaction. Recent progress has come from researchers' ability to leverage new methods and tap novel and increasingly large datasets. These advances extend the available testable hypotheses and expand the diversity and inventory of data that bear on compelling questions about the complex system of language and its intersection with human populations. The collection of workshops, refereed talks and posters and invited talks will strike a spark to consolidate new directions. While the contributions are selective (60% acceptance rate), the conference targets a wide virtual audience through social media engagement and online video dissemination (to be available for classroom use). Our goal is to make NWAV 44 a forum to review foundational issues in the field and generate novel questions and premises that will guide the next decade of research.

To focus that goal, we are pleased to integrate the NSF-sponsored Variation at the Crossroads Workshop. The theme targets the boundaries between traditional sociolinguistics and other areas of linguistics by examining how variation is dealt with across subdisciplines. Leading investigators in acquisition, syntax, documentation, corpus and historical linguistics whose innovative research has forged a link with variation will present their work. A targeted session of refereed papers accompanies each plenary talk. Related posters and additional talks are also designated as such. Bill Labov, the founder of Variationist Sociolinguistics, will provide a closing commentary. We anticipate that this workshop will increase interdisciplinary exchange regarding language variation. These disciplines have been specifically selected to consolidate and synthesize ideas and innovations: Two are integral to NWAV's original purview: historical linguistics and linguistic theory. Two have arisen subsequent to technological developments: instrumentation for phonetics in language acquisition and computational tools for corpus linguistics. The fifth will demonstrate the existing power of interdisciplinarity as she discusses her work that crosses over variationist sociolinguistics, endangered language documentation, creole studies and language contact.

Jack Chambers and Shana Poplack will give plenary lectures, highlighting Canada's place at the center of the Crossroads.

We hope that you will find time to **explore Toronto**. The conference website and this booklet provide information about transit, tourist attractions and food options. We include a selection of our favourite (street) intersections, highlighted throughout the program (from #TorontoIntersections).
